- o Industrial and Scientific



"THE PIRATE LAW"

I am very concerned about the recent passage of the Telecommunications Act. This 'unfair' law was passed by the Federal Legislature on December 29, 1984. This Act makes it illegal to receive HBO or any other pay TV signal using the infamous MDS receiver. (This is also known as the pirate HBO antenna). There are over 5000 pirates in Northeast Philadelphia alone!. I also own an MDS receiver, but I modified it to receive signals other than HBO. There is a law on the books that

There is a law on the books that says it is legal to receive any radio or other signal through the airwaves.

For the new Telecommunications Act to have been passed the cable companies must have had to pay a large sum of money to the Legislature to vote for the passage of the law. I have no evidence to substantiate this accusation, but nobody does something for nothing!

In the State of New Jersey there is a law that prohibits the carrying of a police scanner in the car. If this law is violated, one can receive a stiff fine or worse! However, if you are an Amateur Radio Operator, you are immune to this law. I was told by the FCC that this is for security reasons.

Following the conversation by FCC investigator Frank Crammer, the facts are:

Cable companies have the right to bring a civil suit against anyone violating the new Act. There were many instances where the Radio Amateur had to sign a sworn statement, stating that he/she would not use the MDS receiver to intercept HBO. However, it took a court action to give a statement.

Even the way the cable companies detect the reception of HBO on a pirate dish can be thought of as an invasion of privacy. The receiption of the signal is currently under litigation by F.Lee Bailey in a court action in the San Francisco Bay area.

Laws are written by and for the people. We, as Amateur Radio Operators, see this Act as a violation of our "earned" rights. The purpose of Amateur Radio is to experiment, operate and to expand on the radio art. As I see it, this law can be repealed if all Amateurs made their voice heard loud and strong in Washington, DC.

Therefore, I am appealing to all Radio Amateurs to help in this fight. A very vigorous letter writing campaign should be started bringing these facts to light All letters should be addressed to your Congressman, the FCC and the Honorable Barry Goldwater.

As we all know, there has been various attempts to restrict our operating privileges, even through receiving!!!.

COMPUTER CORNER BY RICH KSHIN

PRINTERS

Another important component of a computer system is a printer. It's kind of hard carrying your computer monitor around with you, so that you can show someone the output of a computer program. "Hard copy" is often desireable, so that you can analyze the results and use them. Some of the uses of this "hard copy" are:

> listing programs obtaining listings from bulletin boards word processing creating lists (address lists, etc)

Word processing is probably the most common use of computers in business today, and is widely used for home applications (this article is being typed on a computer with a word processing program). Word proceesing could be the subject of an entire article. But back to printers. I investigated several makes and models before buying my present printer. When I was looking to purchase my first printer, prices for printers was much higher than they are now, and I elected to go the cheapest route possible. I bought a Commodore printer, which was compatible with the computer and did not require an interface (the device required to translate the data from the computer to the format required to operate most printers). The cost at the time was about \$250.00, which was much less than the \$400.00 plus \$90.00 I would have to shell out for another printer.

The decision to buy this printer was a good one at the time, because it allowed me to greatly expand my computing capabilities and do a lot of programming. It was a temporaru decision, however, because the one drawback of the printer was that it was not "letter quality". It does not have the look of a professional quality typewriter. I found after a period of time, that I had needs to use word processing for such things as writing technical papers, preparing resumes, and other tuping which called for a good quality printer. This made me re-evaluate my printer, and decide to purchase one of the quality needed to meet my needs.

PRINTERS CONTINUED

There are quite a few printers out there. Major brands are Epson, Okidata, SCM, Star Micronics (Gemini), and others. Panasonic has even come out with a line of printers. After careful consideration of all of the features, and the contents of my bank account, I decided on the Gemini SG-10. This printer, having all of the features of the more expensive Epsons and Okidatas (Enhanced print, expanded, graphics, speed, quality, tractor/ fiction feed, etc), is a great value at its list price of \$299.001 And when you can purchase it at a considerable discount at a mail order house, it is a good choice for the hobbyist and even the small businessman. I think you will agree that the quality of this print is so close to that of a typewriter, that it is hard to tell that it is a dot matrix printer!

Anyhow, the bottom line on this is decide what your requirements are, and purchase the printer that best suits your needs and budget.

RECEIVE INDICATOR FOR ICOM HTs: Use the transmit/battery LED to tell you when your 2AT, 3AT, or 4AT is receiving a signal. Connect a 1.8, V4-W resistor between pin 3 of IC2 (the audio ouput amplifier) and the anode of the LED. IC2 is a singlein-line package located next to the speaker hole on the receive PC board at the front of the rig. Pin 1 is the pin toward the center of the board. Connect one lead of the resistor to the third pin and extend the other lead with a short piece of insulated wire. The wire should be soldered to the pad where R56 connects to the wire going to the LED. When the squelch breaks, this modification will cause the LED to light, but transmit operation will not be affected.—Robin Rumbolt WA4TEM, Knoxville TN.

SIMPLE TRANSISTOR TTL-TO-RS232 INTERFACE: This circuit can be used for driving an RS232 printer or RTTY interface from your computer or digital circuit. Transistor Q2 is the \pm 12-V switch, which is driven by Q1. When the TTL input is low (mark condition), Q1 is turned off, which allows Q2 to be turned off. The RS232 output rests at - 12 volts (mark condition). When the TTL input is logic high (5 V), Q1 turns on and drives the base of Q2, turning it on. The RS232 output put will then go to approximately + 12 V (space condition). Resistor R6 maintains a current limit in the event of an RS232 output short circuit. If the output were shorted without R6 in the circuit, the switch transistor Q2 would quickly burn out. The total cost of this simple interface is 32 cents.—Scott M. Freeberg WA9WFA, Ft. Atkinson WI.
