HARC Meeting – April 20


Special April 20 HARC Meeting Radio Astronomy

We're honored to have Rob Welsh, N3RW, an associate astronomer at the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Green Bank, WV. Rob will briefly discuss extra-terrestrial radio 'signals', then discuss the equipment used & finally, discuss some current work being done.

The Triple Play WAS (Worked All States) Award is available to all amateurs worldwide who must use Logbook of the World (LOTW) to confirm QSOs with each of the 50 states on voice, CW, and digital modes. The Triple Play WAS Award is a serial-numbered award starting with # 1. The award is for contacts made after January 1, 2009. Most of the WM3PEN contacts were made during the 13 Colonies week beginning in 2011. Congrats to all who helped make this happen.


HARC Dues Due

Pennsylvania "67" Challenge Award

Amateur Radio operators around the world have the opportunity to participate in the Pennsylvania "67" Challenge. The Challenge, sponsored by the Holmesburg Amateur Radio Club, is to make contact with all 67 Pennsylvania Counties. The Challenge is open to all amateur radio operators regardless of individual station capabilities. All contacts must be 2-way communications made in real time. These contacts may be on any Amateur Radio band/mode.

Contacts made using repeating devices such as FM repeaters, Amateur satellites, moonbounce, and keyboard-to-keyboard contacts through digipeaters/nodes are valid, because these QSOs are made in real or near-real time. Contacts using IRLP, Echolink, or D-Star are valid as long as a radio is being used by both operators. All contacts must be made from the same county.



As an incentive Pennsylvania "67" Challenge certificates may be earned by working stations in 20, 40, 60, or all 67 Counties. Paper or electronic QSLs are acceptable. The contacts can be verified by a local club officer or mailed to the Holmesburg Amateur Radio Club. Complete rules are posted on the HARC website. 30th International Marconi Day Event Set for April 22

Dozens of official "award stations" have registered to take part in the 2017 International Marconi Day (IMD) event, this year being held on April 22, 0000-2359 UTC (starting on April 21 in US time zones). All contacts counting toward the Marconi Award must be made on HF with registered stations, but other participating stations do not need to be registered to claim awards. This year marks the 30th IMD, held each year to mark the anniversary of wireless pioneer Guglielmo Marconi's birth on April 25, 1874. IMD is observed each year on a Saturday close to Marconi's birthday. Many special event stations - some operating from Marconi-related sites - will be on the air. Marconi Award certificates are available for both transmitting stations and shortwave listeners (SWLs).

The event is not a contest but an opportunity for amateurs around the world to make point-to-point contact with historic Marconi sites using HF communication techniques descended from those used by Marconi, and to earn an award certificate for working or hearing a requisite number of Marconi stations.

There are two categories. Transmitting amateurs attempt to complete contacts with 15 of the official award stations, while shortwave listeners attempt to log two-way communications made by 15 of the official award stations.

International Marconi Day special event station GB4IMD will be on the air from Cornwall, helmed by members of the Cornish Amateur Radio Club, which organizes the IMD event. Cornwall was home to some of Marconi's early work. A list of participating stations is on the Cornish Amateur Radio Club's website at, http://gx4crc.com/imd-stations/.

The Kerry Amateur Radio Group in Ireland will be taking part as an IMD award station. EI6YXQ will be set up on the site of the former Marconi Station at Ballybunion. The YXQ suffix commemorates the call sign of the Marconi Station at Ballybunion.


In the US, special event station K2M will be on the air from Binghamton, New York, the site of the remaining Marconi tower, where the inventor demonstrated in 1913 that it was possible to communicate via radio with a fast-moving train.

> Locally, WA3BAT will be on the air from the USS Olympia at Penn's Landing. On September 21, 1899, Marconi arrived in in New York. The directors of the New York Herald hoped that commissioning Marconi's services would generate great public excitement for the upcoming America's Cup race. The event was upstaged by the return home from the Philippines of Admiral Dewey. Marconi quickly fitted his wireless to the flagship Olympic so that he could report the event. For the seventh year, radio amateurs in Norfolk, England, will be active from Caister Lifeboat as part of the IMD celebration. The Norfolk Amateur Radio Club (NARC) will be on the air from special event station GB0CMS at the Caister Lifeboat Visitor Centre to commemorate the village's original Marconi wireless station, established in 1900. The station's original purpose was to communicate with ships in the North Sea and the Cross Sands lightship.

Other IMD sites with historical links to the inventor's work include Cape Cod, Massachusetts (WA1WCC and KM1CC); Nantucket Island (W1AA/MSC); Glace Bay, Nova Scotia (VE1IMD); Villa Griffone, Bologna, Italy (IY4FGM), and many others.

The SSB, CW, Digital, and Open Season QSO Parties are 48-hour events. The Spirit of 76 Party is a weeklong event centering around the 4th of July. The Sprint is a 24-hour event held on the 10th of October (10-10) each year. Low sunspots provide an exciting challenge

The low sunspot count could provide exciting challenges on VHF and UHF

After World War I, radio amateurs discovered worldwide DX on the HF bands via F2 propagation. The experts claimed that the socalled Ultra High Frequencies above 30 MHz were only suitable for Line-of-sight communications.

Today we know differently that there are many other propagation modes present on VHF and UHF and we do not have to depend only on F2 propagation anymore. Many commercial and military stations have already relocated to Satellites for more reliable communications. Then we have worldwide amateur EME that is not affected by tropospheric or ionospheric conditions either.

Solar Cycle 24 is the weakest in a century and is now heading to the next Solar minimum. So instead of hanging up your amateur equipment like the proverbial saddle, start exploring the exciting VHF bands and learn more about the vagaries of VHF communications. It is worth a try. (Southgate ARC) *New Bands!* FCC Issues Amateur Radio Service Rules for 630 Meters and 2,200 Meters

The Amateur Service will officially get two new bands in the near future. The FCC has adopted rules that will allow Amateur Radio access to the 630 and 2,200-meter bands, with minor conditions. A *Report and Order* (*R&O*) was released on March 29. The effective date of the new rules is hard to predict at this point; more below. (This corrects and updates information that appeared in The ARRL Letter edition that circulated to members.) The R&O, which also addresses several non-Amateur Radio issues, allocates the 472-479 kHz band (630 meters) to the Amateur Service on a secondary basis and amends Part 97 to provide for Amateur Service use of that band as well as of the previously allocated 135.7-137.8 kHz band (2,200 meters). The R&O also amends Part 80 rules to authorize

radio buoy operations in the 1900-2000 kHz band under a ship station license.

"It's a big win for the Amateur community and the ARRL," ARRL CEO Tom Gallagher, NY2RF, said. "We are excited by



the FCC's action to authorize Amateur Radio access for the first time on the MF and LF spectrum."

The FCC said the Amateur Radio service rules it has adopted for 630 meters and 2,200 meters allow "for co-existence with Power Line Carrier (PLC) systems that use these bands." Utilities have opposed Amateur Radio use of the MF and LF spectrum, fearing interference to unlicensed Part 15 PLC systems used to manage the power grid.

Amateurs operating on 472-479 kHz would be permitted a maximum equivalent isotropically radiated power (EIRP) of 5 W, except in parts of Alaska within 800 kilometers (approximately 496 miles) of Russia, where the maximum would be 1 W EIRP. Amateurs operating in the 135.7-137.8 kHz band could run up to 1 W EIRP.

The FCC is requiring a 1-kilometer separation distance between radio amateurs using the two new bands and electric power transmission lines with PLC systems on those bands. Amateur Radio operators will have to notify UTC of station location prior to commencing operations.

The FCC also placed a 60-meter (approximately 197 feet) above-ground-level (AGL) height limit on transmitting antennas used on 630 meters and 2,200 meters. The bands would be available to General class and higher licensees, and permissible modes would include CW, RTTY, data, phone, and image. Automatically controlled stations would be permitted to operate in the bands. More details soon, on the ARRL website.

Effective Date

The fact that the new rules contain a new information-collection requirement -- notification of operation to the UTC -- makes it difficult to guess at an effective date. The FCC *R&O* says the Office of Management and Budget (under the Paperwork Reduction Act) must first approve the information-collection requirements (in §97.303[g][2]). Then, the revised Part 97 rules sections will become effective after the FCC publishes a notice in *The Federal Register* "announcing such approval and the relevant effective date." (ARRL Letter)

13 Colonies Update

In the past few days there have been additional updates for the 13 Colonies Special Event.

- 4) WA3PZO doing a presentation at Philmont and the Philadelphia Digital Radio Association in April and May.

LOTW WAS Update

For the ARRL Worked All States Award WM3PEN has either earned or is coming close to working all 50 states in particular modes or bands.

All 50 states – Mixed, Phone, CW, Digital, and 20 Meters and 20 Meter phone, Triple Play.

For those categories of 40 and above. 48 States on 40 Meters, 45 States on PSK31, 42 on RTTY, 45 on 40 Phone, 46 on 40 cw, 46 on 20 cw, 41 on 20 PSK31, 40 on 15 Phone, 212 towards the 5 – Band WAS. (need 250).
