Amateur radio has sure come a long way since I first became interested in pumping some RF into the atmosphere. From simple one tube transmitters, \$69.96 (list price) receivers, and scrap wire for antennas to instantaneous 100% error-free digital communications without even a ham in the shack-whew! It makes your head spin when you think about it. Now there's television, computer communications, remote control of your low band station with midget H.T.'s, sattelite mounted repeaters, moon bounce, you name it— if it hasn't been developed for application to amateur radio yet, you'll probably read about it in new month's QST.

This brings me closer to the purpose of this article (AHA! you were wondering if I'd ever get there.) This article really deals with the dwindling ranks of the amateur radio fraternity, and what we, as amateurs, are doing to insure those ranks keep right on dwindling down to oblivion.

I don't have to quote you facts and figures that show that not only are the numbers of amateur radio operators on the decline, the average age of the hams is going up, and that the number of new licensees is going way down. These are all facts that we've read in the various amateur radio publications complete with all the numbers substantiating these claims.

You've heard all kinds of reasons, I'm sure explaining possible reasons for this phenomenon. I'm sure many of these reasons are correct. But we have lost sight of something which I believe is the most important reason of all.

Let's take a step back and analyze what differences there are between now and then in attracting the budding newcomer to the hobby (and we all agree that's what the hobby is missing- fresh young blod supercharged with a passion for the hobby that got most of us motivated as teenagers.)

Take a look through a current QST, CQ, or 73 magazine and you'll see that the average ham station today is a high-tech atomosphere of digital this and memory that and beautiful little megabuck boxes that can do everything from remembering what frequency you used for that qso you had 3 years ago to sending a television picture to a buddy of yours in California by bouncing the signal off of some star in a far away galaxy that the U.S.S. Enterprise needed warp speed to get to.

Come on people! Showing young teenagers this kind of stuff is certainly going to be interesting, but it is certainly not going to increase the ranks of the fraternity to any great extent. It costs too damm much! The only teenagers, I know that can afford this kind of equipment (i.e. packet radio controllers, computes, VHF UHF tranceivers, Yagi antennas, rotors, etc., etc., etc.) are those with fairly well-to-do parents who in my opinion, are too generous to their children! Come on now! It doesn't take a genious to see why the hobby attracted so many "fired-up" teenagers in the 50's and 60's! Take a look through the QST'S, CQ and 73 from those years and you will see just what I'm talking about! Sure! They still had stations that cost many thousands of dollars! These stations were fuel for fantasy for just about all of us back then. But, and this is a big but, what attracted us all to the hobby during these years of amateur and growth was the fact we could

communicate with other hams in other countries and other states for very little money. You didn't have to be born into an upper middle class family to get on the air at 15 years of age. During the 50's, there was expensive radio equipment available commercialy,, but nearly everyone modified WWII surplus equipment to get on the air. And more importantly it was OK to do this! Amateur radio magazines were filled with "conversion" articles. Putting together an amateur radio station might have still been more expensive a hobby than collecting bottle caps, but the amount of money required was still a realistic amount that a kid earned during a summer job! During the 60's there were still commercially available transmitters selling new for between \$50(Ameco) and \$80(Heathkits).

Looking through an amateur radio magazine today will quickly inform a would be ham that he is going to have to spend a minimum of \$500 to buy a normal no frill rig(new), and if he doesn't already have a computer, he's informed by many hams that it may cost him over \$1000.00 to "work the world" and \$200 to \$400 just to communicate locally(for a 2 meter FM tranceiver).

This is what's scaring off potential new hams! We have to stop showing them all this high-budget-high-tech electronic equipment that they can't afford and go back to showing them the reason we all got involved in the first place-so we could communicate with another ham far, far away without having to finance your radio shack!

True, miltary surplus is not as available as it was in the 50's, and true, low-priced kits are not as available as in the 60's, but jeez, just look at the bargins in the back of the magazines on SSB/CW tranceivers (that in the 60's and 70's we used to fantasize about!)!! They're at every hamfest, too! What's the matter with you people anyway for no code licensing so more people will become hams? This won't bring more people into the hobby! Showing them the high-tech glory that can be theirs for just \$1000 so they can communicate with someone as "far" away as Massachusets digitally won't bring more people into the hobby! Showing them what can be done-with- a used 200 transceiver and a hunk of wire....showing them how much fun it is exchanging information about coultures in various parts of the world with this \$200 station....exposing them to the international fraternity of amateur radio which supercedes race, nationalities, vastly differing political ideologies...discussing various aspects of daily living with some laid back Carribean Islander, sheep farming with a New Zealander! This is the amateur radio that used to attract all the hams during the high growth years of our wonderful hobby. This is the amateur radio that is still going on every single day! Why don't we show this amateur radio to the teenagers of today instead of all the expensive high-tech stuff which is promulgated in the magazines today that they cannot afford anyway?

TELECOMMUNICATIONS WAS RESERVED FOR A GROUP OF PEOPLE FOND OF LATE-NIGHT KEYBOARD SESSIONS, BUT NOTHING "SERIOUS" WAS DEVELOPING IN THE WORLD OF ONLINE TELECOMMUNICATIONS. OH, HOW TIME FLIES.

IN CALIFORNIA, A LOS ANGLES SYSOP BECAME AN INFORMATION AGE

SOME OF THIS LEGISLATION WILL CHANGE THE NATURE OF TELECOMMUNICATIONS IMMEDIATELY; ALL OF IT WILL, IN SOME WAY, SHAPE THE EVOLUTION OF TELECOMMUNICATIONS.

AS ONE ONLINE WAG STATED: "THIS IS NO TIME TO LET SLEEPING DOGMAS LIE."

THE STATEMENT "INFORMATION IS POWER" WOULD DRAW LITTLE DEBATE.
COMBINE THAT POWER OF INFORMATION WITH TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND
YOU BEGIN TO SEE WHY THE AREA OF "TELELAW" IS ONE OF THE HOTTEST
ISSUES AROUND.

OF THE MANY AREAS IN THE TELECOMMUNICATIONS INDUSTRY BEING CHALLENGED BY LEGAL ACTIONS AND CHAMPIONED BY LOBBYIST GROUPS, THREE KEY ISSUES ARE RECOGNIZED: THE PRIVACY RIGHTS OF ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS, ILLEGAL COMPUTER ACCESS, AND THE FEDERAL REGULATION OF DATA COMMUNICATIONS.

THE FOLLOWING IS A LISTING OF THE PENDING LEGISLATION ON THE FEDERAL LEVEL. NOT INCLUDED IS A BILL ABOUT TO BE INTRODUCED BY SENATOR PATRICK LEAHY (D-VA) THAT WILL, IF PASSED, AMEND THE WIRE TAP ACT. SO RISE UP, YE MODEM MINUTEMEN, AN ACTIVE PART ON THE BEHALF OF TELECOMMUNICATIONS IS NEEDED--NOW.

Meeting called to order by our Pres. Tony Musero, K3UKW. Introductions were made, minutes were read and


