MAY ARRL TO FCC - "NO-CODE - NO WAY!"

Responding to overwhelming opposition to the concept of a no-code license by the membership, the ARRL Board of Directors voted at the Board Meeting last week to file comments stating in the strongest possible manner the opposition of the League to the no-code proposal. This is the statement adopted by the Board explaining the position taken.

"1. The Board initially registered opposition to the concept of a codeless license when it was first raised, citing amateur opinion disclosed by the LRPC Florida State Survey.

"2. Following issuance of Docket 83-28, and up to the time of this Board Meeting, ARRL has maintained an essentially neutral stance, editorially, in correspondence and in discussions. ARRL leadership, to this point, has refrained from attempts to direct or prejudice membership response.

"3. Membership opinion continues to be overwhelmingly opposed to dropping the code requirement. Any tolerance for a nocode license appears to arise more from acceptance of its presumed inevitability than acknowledgement of any intrinsic benefits perceived for the Amateur Radio Service. "4. Board discussions in depth have led to the conclusion that no satisfactory compromise formula for a codeless license can be established in the foreseeable future. Considering the obligation of the Amateur Radio Service to its public service commitments and disciplined use of the radio spectrum, the board has no alternative but to reject the proposal.

"5. The board is keenly aware of the desirability of encouraging more people, particularly young persons, to join the ranks of Amateur Radio. It is only the method proposed by the Commission that is unacceptable. For its part the Board will continue to seek to improve and extend ARRL programs to reach and support the entry of newcomers to Amateur Radio.

"Therefore, the ARRL Board of Directors meeting in annual session in Hartford, CT on April 21 and 22, 1983, has adopted the following resolution.

"Whereas, the FCC has proposed in Docket 83-28 a significant revision in the structure of the amateur service by introducing a new class of code free amateur license and

entry into the amateur ranks of additional persons, especially bright young persons, but has found little evidence that the requirement for a knowledge of morse code is a significant barrier to such entry and

"Whereas, the ARRL, as the national organization of radio amateurs, has carefully assessed the views of its members concerning the importance of the continuation of a morse requirement for obtaining an amateur license and

"Whereas, the League officers, directors and staff have reviewed the impact of a new license class upon the volunteer examination program proposed in Docket 83-27, and

"Whereas, the League, conscious of the significant contributions made by an Amateur Radio Service which is composed of highly qualified and highly motivated individuals, is concerned that there be no further reduction in the long established entry standards, now, therefore BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Direc-

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the ARRL in annual meeting assembled that the general manager is directed to prepare for filing by counsel comments in the matter of Docket 83-28 stating in the strongest possible manner the opposition of the League to the creation of an amateur license class that does not require demonstration of a knowledge of the Morse code."

✓ The ARRL filed comments with the FCC on the volunteer examination proposal, P.R. Docket No. 83-27, April 25. The League's comments made some suggestions to clarify volunteer licensing procedures.

The League is concerned because the Volunteer Examination Coordinator (VEC) would suffer from extensive unreimbursed expenses incurred while administering amateur exams. The League feels that the Commission must allow the VEC to charge a fee to administer exams.

The amount charged should not produce a profit for the VECs. Fees must be kept to a minimum to cover actual expenses, such as printing and postage. This is the only way the League will participate in the Volunteer Examination Program. Without such a fee system, the long-term financial health of the VEC would be in jeopardy, and, therefore, the whole volunteer exam program would be in jeopardy, also. See June "Happenings" for details. V At the Board Meeting, the ARRL Directors acted on several other topics in addition to the no-code license and the volunteer examination program. Here are some of the highlights of the major actions taken. (Full minutes of the meeting will appear in the June issue of QST.) 1AY

After several studies, the Board adopted the position of the VRAC on the issue of the 15-kHz "splinter" channels in the 146- to 148-MHz repeater subband. West of the Continental Divide, there is no particular problem, so the resolution leaves good enough alone. East of the Divide, two conflicting coordination plans are in effect for splinter channels -upright and inverted. Either system works, but mixing the two does not. Because there are more upright splinter repeaters east of the Divide and wishing to minimize inconvenience, the Board adopted a five-year phase-in of a policy of all upright repeaters east of the Divide. That is, all repeaters between 146 and 147 MHz will be low in/high out, and all between 147 and 148 MHz will be high in/low out. The Board also asked the VRAC to study ways of improving the national repeater coordination system.

The Board decided to try an experiment at the next two National Conventions by conducting membership meetings open to members only. Each person entering will be required to establish that he or she is an ARRL member in good standing. The ARRL President will serve as moderator, and all Directors shall be present to respond to members' queries.

The Board instructed the General Manager to institute a policy of purchasing all items that are to be evaulated in QST's Product Review. After completion of such evaluation, the item shall be made available for sale. An initial pool of \$12,000 was established for this program.

The Board established the ARRL Scholarship Endowment Fund honoring Senator Barry M. Goldwater, K7UGA, and appointed the ARRL Foundation to serve as the fund administrator. The ARRL President shall appoint a committee to develop suitable selection for the scholarship award.

✓ The FCC has gotten more than a few radio amateurs mad when, in typical "kneejerk" fashion, a field office sends a letter to a ham as a result of an RFI complaint by a neighbor. The form letter is obviously intended for a CBer because it admonishes the recipient to "discontinue using a linear amplifier, increased power, or working skip." But the real harm is that the ham's neighbor gets a copy of the letter. Now at least the Dallas FCC field office no longer sends the "CB letter" to the complaining neighbor, thanks to ARRL Assistant Director Eddie Kuykendall, W5UXP. Kuykendall persuaded the District Engineer to use a "neutral" letter when answering the person complaining about RFI. No FCC field office should respond to a citizen complaining about RFI by branding a ham as a CBer and adjudging him guilty of "working skip."

Von April 15 the FCC released a Public Notice updating the Amateur Radio Station Call Sign Assignment System. The notice says the Commission does not intend to reissue unassigned call signs in the forseeable future. It extends to two years the time in which an expired call sign can be renewed, and during which an expired secondary call sign can be transferred to a primary license. Finally, it sets forth a new prefix block, KP5, for Desecheo Island, formerly KP4 along with nearby Puerto Rico.

George Woodward, W1RN, and George Collins, KC1V, of the Technical Department and Steve Pink, KF1Y, of the Club and Training Department have announced their intentions of moving on to positions elsewhere. Hint: Send a resume in now if you are interested in working at ARRL Hq.

V Contributed technical articles for QST have been arriving in greater number than during recent months. This has helped to "shore up" the rather grim picture portrayed on our schedule board. All QST issues through October 1983 are now filled, tentatively, with technical copy.

✓ Last time we mentioned the new Australian videotapes in the Hq. Film Library, but we failed to mention the formats available. We can supply copies only in the VHS format. (Sorry, we do not have the facilities for reproducing Beta-format tapes.) ✓ Last time we reported on the CBS news story which mistakenly called an Amateur Radio operator a CBer. Two of our readers who work for CBS have notified us that they've contacted the editors, pointing out the error. Major news organizations try very hard to get the facts straight. If you know of a situation where a ham is mistakenly identified as a CBer by the media, contact the editor and point out the error in a calm, businesslike manner. You probably won't get a "retraction," but the next time the editor will double check when a reporter mentions a "CBer."

V The Amador County Amateur Radio Club of California has petitioned for a change of section from the San Joaquin Valley Section to the Sacramento Valley Section. Amador County is on the northern edge of SJV. A preference poll is underway with ballots to be returned by May 6. This poll has been coordinated with the assistance of Director Stevens and the two section managers involved. Should the poll indicate a change is warranted, the matter would be brought to the attention of the Executive Committee.

♥ Dr. Ted Cohen, N4XX, is going on CBS Radio as of May 16 with his show "Report on Personal Computers." This is an outgrowth of his show of the same title carried on Washington CBS affiliate, WTOP. Dr. Ted is a columnist for <u>CQ</u> and <u>Signal</u> magazines and provides part of the propagation information carried in <u>QRZ</u> <u>DX</u>.

VA few of you mentioned that issues of <u>Amateuradio</u> have been appearing in your <u>mailbox</u> lately. <u>Amateuradio</u> is the <u>League's</u> monthly public information newsletter, used to keep government officials and Congresspeople informed about Amateur Radio news and public service. <u>Amateuradio</u> is also sent to subscribers of <u>The ARRL</u> Letter, as a free bonus.

The ARRL Letter, as a free bonus. If you don't need the issues of Amateuradio, please pass them on to a local government official (police chief, for example). We need to keep them aware of the Amateur Radio Service.

✓ The FCC has eased or eliminated licensing requirements for several commercial services. The changes will appear in the <u>Federal</u> <u>Register</u>, and will probably become effective 30 days later.

DX

In the last issue, we reported that the Spratly crew was under attack. According to press reports the German yacht <u>Siddhartha</u> was attacked at close range (presumably by the Vietnamese) and sank on April 10 just off the coast of Amboyna Cay, a small island in the Spratly group.

Baldur Drobnica, DJ6SI, Norbert Willand, DF6FK, Peter Marx, the yacht's skipper and his wife, Jenny, were picked up by the Linden, a Panamanian ship.

Diethelm Muller, DJ4EI, died when the yacht was attacked; Gero Band, DJ3NG, died at sea a few days later.

The small islands were worth little more than the deposits of fertilizer produced by bird droppings, until the discovery of oil in the nearby waters made them potentially significant. Vietnam, China, Taiwan, The Philippines and Indonesia all claim the Islands.

▼ K2BSA will be dusted off once again as the Cavalcade of Scouting operates from Bergen Community College (NJ) on May 20-22. Look for them 5 kHz inside General portion of all bands 160 - 2 meters on all modes (cw/phone/RTTY/SSTV(20m)/ATV).

K2BSA is the callsign of the Boy's Life Radio Club -- the Boy Scout National station.

Want your net listed in the <u>Net</u> <u>Directory</u>? Send the net name, frequency (input and output for repeaters), meeting days and times, and the manager's call sign to ARRL Hq. before June 1. Form CD-85, available from Hq. for an s.a.s.e., is the official registration card and is helpful but not mandatory.

Space

The launch of Phase IIIB via the European Space Agency's Ariane vehicle has slipped from the first week in June to a yet to be determined date, perhaps as much as six weeks later. According to information relayed from the AMSAT launch crew at the site in Kourou, French Guiana, the delay stems from problems with the turbo pumps in the third stage and the inertial navigation system. "The problems are multi-dimensional and not insignificant," says AMSAT's Jan King, W3GEY.

The crew has completed the assembly of Phase IIIB up to the fueling stage. The balance of the work will be completed only after ESA has set a firm launch date. AMSAT expects ESA to set a new date May 16.


