HARC Promotes Amateur Radio at Northeast Philadelphia History Fair April 13th 2024

Your first question might be what does ham radio have to do with a History Fair. For most clubs the answer might be the Morse code connection. For HARC it was the Club promoting Philadelphia history via the annual 13 Colonies Special Event in July.

The Fair consisted of about 30 local history groups representing Lenape Indians, Rochambeau's march down the King's Highway, Grand Army of the Republic, several genealogical societies, Camp William Penn, various historic buildings, and the Holmesburg Amateur Radio Club.

We were approached by the organizers and asked if we would like to participate. Besides having our presentation table, they thought it would be interesting if we could also set up a demonstration station. It was not possible to do this inside but thanks to POTA operator Andrew, W3AWC, we were able to set up a station outside the main entrance to the event. Everyone saw us as they walked in. Weather was not our friend that day. High winds and temperatures in the low 50s. With the assistance of Tony, WO3I and Carl, N3ZZK, Andrew made a number of HF contacts, running 10 watts with his G90 transceiver and a Hamstick antenna. Visitors were then directed inside to see our display which had plenty of information. Staffing the inside table was Rich, K3UJ, Bob, WA3PZO and Dave, KB3AKK.



As visitors came by we explained what the 13 Colonies Event was about and how we promote Philadelphia history by having a different theme on the Event certificate and complimenting WM3PEN QSL cards. We had a 3 ring binder with all of the participating special event station qsl cards as well as the yearly certificate. More importantly we had a one page handout that explained the event.

We used the ARRL handouts on things you can do with ham radio along with the history of Morse Code, and the Club. QSL cards were given as handouts with the Club email address on it where they could write for more information. At the end of the table was a straight key and an oscillator. The code was posted. Visitors had the opportunity to send their first name in Morse Code and upon being successful they would earn a nice certificate.

Visitor questions ranged from what is ham radio, what is the 13 Colonies event, and do you still use Morse Code? Others talked about their working years in electronics or that they or a relative was in the Service and used Morse Code. Probably the most difficult topic to cover was "can I hear ham radio on a shortwave receiver". The answer was - it depends. Many had small pocket sw radios. but did they don't receive sideband. There was no one answer that fit all cases.

Some said they would email the Club for more info. Others expressed interest in coming to a club meeting. With the club info we included a club membership sheet at half price. Also included was information on joining the ARRL via the Club.

We were prepared with our 'elevator' speech. For those not familiar with this term, an elevator speech involves getting your message out in the amount of time it takes to go one floor on an elevator. There were several, depending on the topic. You need to grab the visitor's attention quickly before they move on.

It was a successful day telling the ham radio story and promoting the Holmesburg club. Us club representatives also enjoyed visiting the other exhibits and learning more about Northeast Philadelphia History. And it is a rich one, besides the early colonists in the 1600's, the Lenni Lenape made this region their home for many years. Artifacts are still being found.

PNBR Support

Amateur radio in the Delaware Valley and cycling have a long history of collaboration, and the Holmesburg Amateur Radio Club's collaboration with the 15th annual Philadelphia Naked Bike Ride continued that proud tradition.

The Philadelphia Naked Bike Ride, or PNBR for short, is a part of the World Naked Bike Ride, a worldwide movement advocating reduced fossil fuel usage, positive body image, and cycling advocacy by using nudity to showcase the vulnerability of cyclists. PNBR is one of the largest in North America, regularly attracting over 3000 cyclists, and a ride that large has obvious communication problems when it gets under way. The biggest issue was that the front of the ride needed to know where the back of the ride was, so that the front could set a pace to keep the ride together, but we could not reliably communicate that information quickly.

I've been involved in the ride since 2016, and pretty much immediately set about trying to solve the communications problems. We'd tried FRS walkietalkies, walkie-talkie apps like Zello, group phone calls, text threads, and everything seemed to break down for one reason or another. I'd been interested in amateur radio for a number of years, saw how useful they could be at the MS150 ride, and got my ticket in March of 2023 with the help of Dennis Silage K3DS.

I set out trying to build a radio team. I recruited Erik Dixon KC3OTY, Jax Loesch KC3UFO, and Jonathan Caicedo N3JEC to help, and aside from some minor repeater hiccups on K3TU, it went AMAZINGLY.

After the success of the 2023 Ride, I started encouraging more cyclists to get their license, and eventually five got licensed in time for the ride: Mountain KC3ZOZ, Jon KC3ZPR, Ee KC3ZPA, Kimee K1MEE, and Mae KC3ZBB. Since K3TU was down for maintenance, on the test rides we did signal checks and worked out that WM3PEN had the most reliable signal over the largest portion of the route. After we got clearance for the event, we programmed our radios with WM3PEN as the primary, switching to 2m Simplex East of Broad Street. Additionally, 10 RX-only HTs handed to trusted volunteers spread throughout the ride gave us a greater ability to communicate requests and information beyond the amateur operators.

The day of the ride went swimmingly. Myself and Ee KC3ZPA were the advance team radio operators, Mountain KC3ZOZ was the frontline operator, Kimee K1MEE and Jon KC3ZPR were the column marshals', with Erik KC3OTY and Jax KC3UFO bringing up the rear as sweeps. Once we nailed down some communications protocols on the fly, information flowed freely and reliably. The back was able to talk to the front, and the ride column stayed together perfectly. The ride ended at Drexel Park in West Philly, and the repeater was returned to normal amateur operation with our most sincere gratitude.

The PNBR and Philly cycling community looks forward to working with HARC in the future, and growing the hobby by getting even more cyclists licensed!
